The World Health Organization reports the prevalence and number of diabetes cases have steadily increased over the past several decades. The latest numbers include more than 11.5% of the U.S. population with 29.7 million who have been diagnosed and 8.7 million who have not. In adults, between five and 10% are diagnosed with type 1, while type 2 accounts for 90 to 95% of all cases.

Laura Walker, RN and a Certified Diabetes Care and Education Specialist at Greene County Medical Center, urges patients to follow through when referred for diabetes education and monitoring.

"Medicare and Medicaid have expanded coverage for Continuous Glucose Monitoring (CGM) over the past year to help patients improve glucose control," she explained. "Many people are wearing them, but many more would qualify. These are a great alternative to poking your finger."

Walker works directly with patients, assisting them in selecting the glucose monitoring device appropriate for their needs and insurance coverage. She can also help with set-up and training on the equipment, provide suggestions on lifestyle adjustments to improve glucose control and assist providers with modifying medications or insulin.

"With the growing prevalence of diabetes around the globe, it is becoming more important than ever to know what tools are available and to utilize them to ensure better health," said Walker. "Whether the tool is technological or comes from the guidance of a healthcare professional, we are here to support you in gaining control and working toward reaching your goals."

The recent community needs survey conducted by Greene County Public Health identified the need for more mental healthcare providers in our region. Greene County Medical Center responded with the addition of two new providers in Behavioral Health Services.

Mary Jo Koch joined the Team at the end of January and Licensed Master of Social Work, Madisyn Behrens began seeing patients in mid-May.

Behrens, the Paton native, said the calling to pursue a career where she could help others came at a young age. However, it was while studying for her master's degree that she elected to concentrate on mental health.

"I chose to narrow my focus on behavioral health during my practicum as I learned more, with the assistance of Bonnie Riphagen, LMSW, about the depths and how empowering doing therapy can be," Behrens said.

She added that behavioral health is nothing new, but is becoming more recognized as a greater number of individuals reach out for services.

Behrens received an associate's degree from Des Moines Area Community College, a bachelor's in social work from the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) and a master's of social work from Campbellsville University.

After a lifetime of providing care, Connie Neese is thriving because of the great care she now receives

Connie Neese is a caregiver. First to her family and then as a nurse; and after everything she has seen and done, she points to the many ways the Holy Spirit is at work in their lives.

A recent example accompanied the anticipation of a new great grandchild. The father, Max, found a familyfriendly vehicle online and arranged to look at it. The owner recognized the

name and asked if he knew Connie. Tears formed in the man's eyes when he learned it was Max's grandmother. "She saved my life," he said. The gentleman was a nurse with a past and Connie took a chance, hiring him at Woodward State Hospital.

Daughter-in-law, Kate Neese, said Connie now sees the Holy Spirit at work through the care she receives as a patient in the Extended Care program at Greene County Medical Center. "It's full circle because she was always the caregiver. Now she gets good care because she gave good care. What she was putting out, she is getting back."

A vibrant, active woman. Connie worked her way up to head the nursing department at Woodward State Hospital while also covering shifts at Greene County Medical Center. Her big heart and strong work ethic were evident as she raised five kids, worked on the farm and raised her stepsiblings; all while studying to be or working as a nurse.

Connie retired from nursing about 20 years ago following a motorcycle accident in which she and her late husband, Dale, sustained serious injuries resulting in a couple months in skilled care at Greene County Medical Center. Dale later passed away and Connie's health changed during COVID and she opted to reside with Greene County Medical Center's long-term care. "When long-term closed, we were fortunate enough to keep her in the medical center's Extended Care program," Kate said.

The entire family has peace of mind knowing Connie is extremely well cared for and they are grateful to the dedicated Team who make Extended Care her home. "She just gets wonderful care," Kate said. "One day they called and said Connie was feeling a little down. I came out and



we ate in the beautiful windowed room and visited. I took her back to her room, and as I was walking away, I wasn't listening, but I just heard them ask if she was feeling better. When people don't know they're being listened to and they're having a private conversation, you find out they are a truly caring person."

Kate added it is the little things making a huge difference in defining quality of care. "It's hard on families to see parents fail," Kate said. "But if you are in this situation, this is a great place to be and you don't have to worry. Because of you, she is thriving."

Over the past few years, the Foundation has aided in the purchase of a bone density scanner, an EDG (esophagogastroduodenoscopy) scope and a multi-use ultrasound machine for urological, cardiac, pain, emergency, acute and orthopedic

PATIENTS & RESIDENTS BENEFIT FROM COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Grow Greene County Gaming Corporation held its annual grant awards ceremony at Wild Rose Casino & Resort this spring, distributing over \$2 million to nonprofits in Greene and surrounding counties. Greene County Medical Center's Pain Clinic received \$42,000 for radiofrequency ablation equipment. With the phenomenal growth of the Pain Clinic over the last two years more patients than ever will find relief through this outpatient treatment.

During the procedure, the provider uses the equipment to apply radiofrequency

waves directly to the nerve causing pain. A lesion results, blocking pain signals and providing relief for six months to a year or even more for some patients.

The Greene County Community Foundation announced they were awarding more than \$245,000 this past April. Ever Greene Ridge received \$5,500 to purchase and install handicap-accessible doors at the main entrance. Residents are thrilled that one of their major wish-list items became a reality due to this partnership between the Greene County Community Foundation and the Greene County Medical Center Foundation.

lowering her blood sugar numbers while maintaining quality of life. "Katie is really good, very knowledgeable and able to help me find solutions," Carey said.

She also works with Greene County Medical Center Dietitian, Erica Vandenberg, who has helped her design

Over 25 years ago, Sharon Carey was diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes. She said genetics and environmental factors both played a role in its development. "This is in my family, it is kind of a hereditary thing," Carey explained. "Now, my son has it and my daughter has it."

Carey lived in Churdan for more than 50 years. However, about three years after the death of her husband in 2015, she made a move to Jefferson. This also brought her to Greene County Medical Center for her ongoing healthcare needs.

For many years, Carey managed her Type 2 diabetes with oral medications, but as time passed, it progressed, leading to the daily

injection of insulin. She started at once per day but was frightened by the prospect of having that increase to as much as three or four times per day.

The diabetes coupled with stomach issues she was battling made Carey a candidate for the Chronic Care Management program at Greene County Medical Center. She works closely with nurse coordinator, Katie Nelson, RN. "We talk about every 10 days or two weeks," she said. "She tries to keep me on the straight and narrow."

During their sessions, Nelson will check Carey's glucose monitor and discuss what has happened since they last met. She provides advice on lifestyle adjustments for



a personalized nutrition plan that factors in her healthcare and exercise history, goals and food preferences.

Carey admits this has not been easy, especially since she is often tripped up by a love of ice cream. "They have made suggestions for ice creams with lower carbs, and that has been helping," she said.

Although there is a lot of hard work involved, Carey is grateful for the Chronic Care Management Team at Greene County Medical Center. She said the more she learns about how to manage her chronic conditions, the more she feels in control of her life and less frightened about what her future holds.

Interested in Chronic Care Management?

The Chronic Care Management program provides patients with two or more chronic conditions access to round-the-clock care to help keep treatments on track while achieving their health goals. It is now recommended that women who are at average risk for breast cancers should begin annual screening mammograms at age 40. These can be scheduled through your primary care provider or the Imaging Department at Greene County Medical Center.

As an added convenience, patients who had their last mammogram at least one year prior and whose images are on file at the medical center can participate in **WALK-IN MAMMO MONDAYS** from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. If you have questions about this service, please call the Imaging Department at 515-386-0443.

WARNING SIGNS OF A HEART ATTACK

LISTEN TO YOUR BODY

Most people think of chest pain when they think of heart attack symptoms, but signs vary greatly. Some symptoms are severe and come on quickly. Others may begin with mild discomfort or pain. The most important thing is to listen to your body and call 911 or contact your primary provider for any of the following:

CHEST DISCOMFORT OR PAIN

The majority of heart attacks include some

form of chest pain or discomfort.

PAIN OR DISCOMFORT IN UPPER BODY

Arms, back and neck or e jaw and stomach l

SHORTNESS OF BREATH

Can occur with or without chest pain/ discomfort

OTHER SIGNS

- » Cold sweat
- » Shortness of breath
- » Nausea or vomiting
- » Light headed

BE AWARE THAT SYMPTOMS VARY BETWEEN MEN & WOMEN

Women may experience symptoms less typically associated with a heart attack and often attributed to other conditions:

- » Shortness of breath
- » Nausea or vomiting
- » Back pain
- » Jaw pain

NOVEMBER IS LUNG CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

Lung cancer remains the second most common cancer in the United States and is, by far, the leading cause of cancer death for both men and women.

RISKS FOR DEVELOPING LUNG CANCER:

1. Smoking is the number one risk factor

- 2. Radon
- 3. Other Substances
 - Asbestos
 - Arsenic
 - Diesel exhaust
 - Silica
 - Chromium
- 4. Personal or Family History
- 5. Radiation Therapy to the Chest

REDUCING RISKS

1. Do not start smoking or quit and avoid secondhand smoke

2. Get your home tested for radon

3. Follow health and safety guidelines at work

LUNG CANCER SCREENINGS FOR QUALIFIED INDIVIDUALS

- 50-80 years of age
- 20+ pack-year history of tobacco use
- Currently smoker or quit in the past 15 years

Those meeting this criteria may be eligible for the screening at no cost.

WARNING SIGNS Of a **stroke**

QUICK ACTION SAVES

Every minute counts during a stroke as a rapid response reduces the amount of brain damage. Know the signs and symptoms and what to do so you can act **FAST**

CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY IF YOU OR SOMEONE ELSE EXPERIENCE ANY OF THESE SYMPTOMS

SUDDEN NUMBNESS OR WEAKNESS

Especially on one side of the body

SUDDEN COGNITIVE & COMMUNICATION ISSUES

Confusion, trouble talking or understanding others

SUDDEN TROUBLE SEEING

From one or both eyes

SUDDEN MOBILITY PROBLEMS

Dizziness, loss of balance and/or coordination, trouble walking

SUDDEN SEVERE HEADACHE WITH NO KNOWN CAUSE

ACT **FAST** TO IDENTIFY A STROKE

- **FACE:** Ask them to smile. Is there a droop on one side?
- **ARMS:** Ask them to raise both arms. Does one arm drop?
- SPEECH: Ask them to repeat something. Does their speech sound odd?

 TIME: If any of these signs are present, call 911 immediately

- Note the time of first symptoms and relay to healthcare team
- DO NOT drive to the hospital or let someone else drive you. Call 911 as soon as possible
- If stroke symptoms resolve quickly, it may be a transient ischemic attack (TIA), or "mini-stroke."
 Contact your healthcare provider about this serious condition
